Meanings of Dyke.

"Dyke" has even more divergent meanings than ditch in Lincolnshire and bank in Holland. In Scotland it means a low wall or fence of turf or unmortgaged stones, and in some parts of northern England a "dyke" is a hedge. Yet there are other northern districts where it is a pond. Originally in English at any rate, "dyke" or "dike" and "ditch" both meant what ditch still means to us, but as the digging out of a ditch necessarily involves the raising of a mound with the dug-out earth the words came to signify ditch and mound together and eventually in some cases the mound alone.—London Standard.
