## Oregon News Notes

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

On Wednesday of this week bids were received by the State Highway Engineer for construction of the Columbia hard surface highway through Clatsop county.

The Brownsville cannery has placed orders for 20,000 crates to hold its pack with Roner Bros Planing Mills at Albany.

A large dock is to be built at Port Orford by Macleay interests of Portland.

With only twelve per cent of the skilled labor of Portland in unions Oregon factories are taking up more and more open shop policies.

The Lane county Manufacturers' Association is making a fight for free factory sites and municipal power at cost to get more industries.

The Riverton mines on the Coquille have contracted for delivery of 2,000 tons of coal to railroad contractors on the Siuslaw.

The Pinchot policy of giving only a fifty year lease to hydro-power development companies has tied up the water powers of Oregon.

Albany has funds completed for a \$25,000 library building.

The Pacific Pressed Face brick plant at Willamina has resumed operation, employing 75 men.

Coos county will erect a \$25,000 exhibit building and display at the Panama Exposition.

Vida, Lane county, will erect a \$3,000-school house.

President Beckwith of the Workingmen's Compensation commission says only five to six hundred of three thousand manufacturers have been willing to come under the provisions of the act.

The hop crop in the Willamette valley promises to yield a bumper crop of 160,000 bales or over this year.

Oregon's strict eugenic marriage law has increased fees received in Clark county, Vancouver, Wash. to \$10,038 for 1913.

Portland men are investigating the prospect for a fruit and vegetable cannery in Baker county.

Railroad officials visit various sections of the state asking extensions, but it is understood that there will be no work undertaken except that provided for on the Willamette-Pacific line to Coos Bay.

Portland will use 200,000 lbs. of pig lead this year in laying water mains.

A large flouring mill is being built at Cove, Union county, to take the place of one burned last year.

A large warehouse is being built at Nelson's siding in Baker county.

Forest Grove cannery is adding a fine warehouse addition.

As a result of too much radical legislation Portland has not a single large manufacturing establishment in sight for 1914.

Geo Young of La Grande is installing machinery and enlarging his candy factory.

Friday a party of 25 Agricultural college students and professors spent the day visiting the principal Salem factories.

Medford is undertaking the construction of a \$50,000 Elks temple.

Congressman Sinnott has secured \$60,000 additional for the Pendleton postoffice.

Hood River pays \$18,000 a year city taxes for 2000 population, and it costs \$200,000 a year for 8000 people of Hood River county.

Flavel has been chosen for docks for the Hill terminals and yardage will be constructed to hold 1000 cars.

Wheeler is to have dockage facilities to transfer water freights.

Three churches are to unite in building a large college at Philomath.

Local capital is developing a large meat packing plant at Springfield.

Milton and Freewater are to have new libraries.

W H Lucke of Canby will build a warehouse at Oregon City.

Oregon Commercial clubs are uniting for more factories and payrolls and less gold-embossed literature and boosting of land values.

As a result of the orders of the welfare commission fixing minimum wages for girls, telephone companies in Yamhill county are advancing rates.

In Marion county it is estimated the \$1500 tax exemption would release one-third of the taxpayers from paying anything and put it on the other two-thirds.

## Political Parties in Oregon
