Oregon News Notes

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

It is proposed to utilize the wire grass that grows on Youngs Bay near Astoria for manufacture of paper.

This week the manufacturers of Lane county will hold an exhibit of their products to encourage home industries.

The Dalles has bought 140 acres on the river front to give free sites for factories.

The Supreme Court has upheld the \$200,000 bond issue of Grants Pass for the purpose of building a section of railroad to the coast.

To relieve unemployed, a bill has been initiated to tax all estates of \$50,000 or over ten per cent for a fund to be expended by a department of public works.

A special vessel has been chartered to carry 40 great Oregon logs to the Panama Exposition for columns for the Oregon building.

The Toledo co-operative creamery is now in operation.

The Oregon Railroad Commission is examining the books and accounts of about fifty public utility corporations to ascertain their physical value and earnings.

Malheur county Pomona grange went on record as opposed to taxing mortgages, as tending to raise interest and keep capital out of Oregon.

Astoria has appointed an industrial commissioner to promote factories, in the person of O. W. Taylor.

Molalla raised a bonus of \$2000 for a pottery plant that is being erected and will soon be in operation.

A factory for the manufacture of lead pipe has been established at Portland, capable of making five thousand miles a year.

Gresham fruit growers are moving to establish a cannery.

It was stated at the Portland Rotary club that anyone with a fair reputation and a good pair of lungs could put over almost any kind of a freak measure in Oregon.

J. E. Tourtellotte, a Portland architect, submitted a plan for using fireproof wood building material for school houses at a saving of nearly fifty per cent over brick or stone.

Astoria has asked bids for the first unit of public docks to unite rail and water transportation.

North Powder has passed an ordinance to construct a gravity water system.

Cottage Grove is erecting a cannery to cost \$6,000.

The Clearwater Lumber Co., of Portland is clearing the site for the erection of a big mill.

The Portland Timberman has issued a bulletin announcing that by its efforts it has just secured a reduction on lumber rates to fifty eastern cities.

Scholars to Help

In fulfilling his pledge to assist and co-operate with the county court in making Good Roads Day in Linn county a great success, county school superintendent, W. L. Jackson, has sent out the following letter to the school teachers of the various county schools and all other school authorities:

In as much as the county court encouraged by the various commercial and civic improvement clubs and other public organizations of the county, has designated May 22 as general road day in Linn county and extends an invitation and urgent request that every citizen of the county, in some way assist, and especially every boy large enough to perform the smallest task work on the road that day. I appeal to you as one through the school who has more than an ordinary opportunity to arouse interest and enlist the boys and girls in this worthy movement. The plan is to secure the names of those who would work on the road at the time mentioned, and report the same to the road supervisor or street commissioner of their respective towns or road districts. This report is very necessary so that proper plans may be formulated to accomplish the greatest results on the day set apart for this work.

The ladies, including the girls of every grade in the schools are invited to assist in preparing a lunch for the noon hour at the school house or some more convenient place near where the work is being done. This is certainly a great opportunity for the school to encourage practical work, to dignify honorable labor and to become a greater factor in the community.
