PLEASING THE CRITICS

The News realizes that it has been subjected to much criticism the past few weeks from certain quarters, and we cannot help but feel that in the main our critics have had no lofty principle at stake in their censure, but rather undertook to shut the paper up on certain questions by a cheap boycott, solely for the reason that we disagreed with them, when eight of the citizens of the town lined up on the street and stopped their papers. Perhaps this might be an effective way of whipping some papers into line, but when we feel that we are in the right on a question, such tactics serve the purpose just as poorly as would a dozen or so new subscribers.

We are here to print the news as we see it and make such comment on matters of vital interest to the town and community as we feel is right. This course may hurt the business of the paper, but that is an aside.

If the people of Scio as a whole (which we do not believe) want a newspaper man to "keep his mouth shut and mind his own business, and quit butting in," as some so happily put it, we are willing to sell out and get out as quick as a buyer can be found.

With the best interests of the city at heart, we cannot help but voice the sentiments of the Lebanon Criterion, which has an editorial along this same line in its last issue, and closes with the following paragraph: "A newspaper that advocates nothing; has no principles to stand up for; takes no sides on public questions, is seldom anything greater than a cipher in the community it is alleged to represent."

Quite often someone with selfish interests to serve drops in at the News office and wants us to give a nice write-up in our next issue (free of cost) devoted to the matter in which they are interested, usually with the explanation, "Of course this will help your business as well as mine." Perhaps it might, but our advertising space is our stock in trade, the same as any other business man's wares. Why wouldn't it be just as consistent for us to go to the meat market or grocery and say, "We are going to have company at our house and if you will send up a nice roast or a sack of sugar, we will call the attention of our visitors to the fact, and it will probably help your business."

The Newberg Graphic, under the head, "Offer of a Free Ride" reproduces the anonymous letter which the writer received a few weeks ago with the following comment: "Our friend, L W Charles, the editor and publisher of the Santiam News, must have been telling the truth about conditions in Scio, for it is the truth that hurts."

Notes from the Elkhorn Mines

The mines of the Elkhorn district are showing considerable activity. Nearly all camps are carrying on developments of various kinds and some new prospects are being located.

A new shoot of rich copper ore has been opened up in the Black Eagle.

Claude Smith and partner have located four claims on a ledge approximately 75 feet wide, northeast of the Crown Mines.

Lyle Shoemaker and Mr. Zimmerman suits of some Gold Creek mines, Claude Smith of the Silver King and H B Holt of Elkhorn were recent visitors to the Crown.

Claude Compton of Lebanon is driving the Georgia Buggy at the Crown.

Ogle mountain mines have their cyanide plant in operation and will start a crew blocking out ore within a few days. They employ about 20 men.

Hugh Freeland's property on Gold creek is reported under option to eastern capitalists.

R E Peery, supt of the Crown mines arrived in the district last week and is now making a preliminary survey for the 1000 foot cross cut tunnel that will cut the Crown's system of veins from 400 to 700 feet in depth.

Drifting is now being carried on in Tunnel No 1 in Dolomite, carrying gold, silver and lead. The work is being done by McKinney Bros, recently from the Great Cranberry mines of North Carolina.

Some very fine copper ore has been found in the workings on the eastern part of the properties.

Rules of the Road.
