Oregon News Notes

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

Work began on the new Simpson hotel at North Bend, to cost \$75,000.

Newport has let a contract for a new high school to cost \$16,000.

Boring gets a new sawmill, lumber company and shingle mill.

The Portland, Eugene and Eastern has finished ballasting its loop tracks at Eugene at an expense of several thousand dollars.

By a break in the plant of the American Can Co at Portland several hundred hands were laid off at Eugene and in the berry fields.

July 14 Silverton votes on a \$15,000 bond issue for better school facilities.

The Pacific States Telephone Co is spending about \$200,000 on new lines to Astoria, and on the Columbia highway to Hood River.

Siuslaw Fishermen's union will operate Rose Hill cannery at Florence.

Iowa is the third state to knock out the Blue Sky law that is also attacked in the federal courts of Oregon.

The S P Co will expend \$16,000 rebuilding 15 miles of highway on the Willamette above Springfield.

A plant will be built at Portland for the manufacture of electrolytic gas at Center and 17th streets.

Indications from the tone of the press are that "safe and sane" will be the test applied to all new laws affecting industries and labor.

Crater Lake gets \$100,000 for highway improvements.

Coos Bay gets a new life saving station to cost \$40,000.

Roseburg shipped the first carload of peaches from Oregon.

Nine measures of the thirty-one to be voted on are aimed at radical changes in taxation laws.

One big lumber company in Baker county will increase its payroll to \$25,000 per month on August 1, and other sawmills will follow suit.

Linn and Benton counties will establish a free ferry at Harrisburg.

The Willamette Pacific will extend train service to Richardson.

The chittem bark industry opens with a good demand at 4 1-2 cents.

Gresham has organized a cannery with 200 stockholders.

Drain will install a \$6,000 city lighting plant.

Astoria is terribly torn up with public improvements, but not kicking.

Marshfield let \$50,000 of street contracts the past week.

Eugene capitalists will finance the McKenzie river road to Crook county.

Gill's Store Robbed Be Your Own

Thresherman

Burglars entered the general store of Hibler & Gill last Sunday night by means of a skeleton key and blew open the safe, securing something between \$25. and \$50. They also took a number of knives and razors and some other small articles.

The robbers evidently understood their business, as nitroglycerine was used and just enough to shatter the combination without injuring anything else.

Sheriff Bodine came over Monday morning and a thorough investigation was made with the result that a number of clues were found, but with little hope of capturing the marauders. Residents of West Scio recognized the carpet which was soaked with water and used against the safe door as one from a vacant building near the depot. The fact that a couple of hobos had been camping there for a few days is significant. A bottle of fluid was also found in the building which some pronounced to be nitroglycerine, but no test of it was made.

Mr Gill estimates the damage to the safe at \$100, which with the loot secured by the thieves, brings his loss to near \$200. It is supposed that the burglars thought a large sum would be left in the safe over Sunday and expected to make a rich haul, but as the bulk of the receipts were deposited in the bank before it closed Saturday they were disappointed in this.
