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AND DON'T MAKE YOUR ONLY STOP IN PORTLAND

Telegraphic reports from the large eastern centers give startling accounts of the soaring of prices of nearly all staple food stuffs due to the world-wide war. Fresh meats, sugar and coffee have made phenomenal advances in prices. Choice cuts of western beef are selling in New York, Chicago and all over the east generally, for from 5 to 8c per pound more than the figures quoted August 1st. Coffee is up from 2 to 5c per pound and sugar is quoted at a price of \$2.00 a sack over quotations of 60 days ago.

With September days at hand the political situation in Oregon is beginning to take on a complexion of life. Immediately following the primary in May, the politicians disappeared from the hotel lobbies and for three months only an occasional political chirp could be heard among the regular chairwarmers in the big Portland hostleries. Now, however, as the election is only a little more than two months off, the political managers and headquarters hangers-on may be seen daily bustling around with a mysterious air of importance.

The two big statewide contests that are beginning to shake us are the senatorial contest and the fight over the governorship. As to the governorship it is very generally conceded in Portland that the withdrawal of U'Pen as the Prohibition nominee has made the outcome as between Smith and Withycombe more problematical than ever. Before U'Pen threw up the "dry" nomination, the logic of the situation pointed to Withycombe as the winner; but now that the Clackamas "law-giver" has elected to stand as an independent candidate, leaving the dry element without a standard bearer, the outcome as between Smith and Withycombe depends on which will get the bulk of the probi vote, and there is no denying that the prohibition vote in Oregon is going to be many fold larger this year than ever before.

Cable advices from Paris and London indicate that the allied armies of France, England and Belgium are in a death grapple with the forces of Germany and Austria along the French frontier from the Swiss border to the Sea. Paris dispatches estimate that there are a million Germans under arms in Alsace and Lorraine. With the allied armies along the French border numbering 800,000, these huge forces are now in the battle, but it is more than likely that it will be a week or ten days before any definite results are known to the outside world. Austria is reported to have withdrawn most of its forces from Serbia in order to meet the Russian advance on the north. The Russian foreign office claims to have penetrated fifty miles into eastern Germany, but the Russians evidently have come to a standstill in front of the fortified cities along the eastern border of the German Empire. No news affecting the German and English fleets is allowed to filter through to the outside world. Italy is reported to have ordered the mobilization of its army. Japan has definitely declared war on Germany and is believed to have attacked the German possessions in Northern China.
