Perhaps one of the most courteous gentlemen one can find is Mr Porter, engineer in charge of the railroad building for the Hammond Co. Your scribe had the pleasure of looking over charts and maps recently that give an inkling of the immense work being done. The new line crosses Rock creek near the "Wiggs cabin." It then bears westerly to the base of the highest green mountain on the ridge between Rock creek and Thomas creek. Curving around the base of the mountain it passes back up Rock creek with a six mile curve and passes the Wiggs cabin again, but 1100 feet above it. Another line is mapped on the top of the ridge with an "incline line" connecting the road on the ridge with the line on the north side below. No engine can lift itself up the incline so they will use powerful reversible donkey engines. The incline line is about one mile in length and double tracked. A strong cable will run around a "drum." When the donkey is letting a carload of logs down one track, "empties" will be going up the track. Some day people in the valley can see the black oil smoke of the engines running along the ridge. One cannot help but admire the skill of the engineer who can plan and superintend the building of such a difficult work including the large number of bridges and trestles.
