Editor Santiam News.

Dear Sir: As requested I will give you a short write up, of the State Convention of the F E and C U of A held in The Dalles Dec. 1-2-3, 1914, covering Oregon and Southern Idaho division. "Success" is the word that characterized all the details of the Convention, both in attendance and work done. Delegates were here from every part of Oregon and Southern Idaho and gave flattering reports of all Locals in the different parts of the two states and what they were doing.

The Delegation from Coos Co. reported they have three Co-operative stores in operation in that County, owned and controlled by the Farmers Union alone and were selling goods to the members of the Union at 10 per cent profit and were making good, increasing their stock and paying a dividend to the stock holders.

The representatives from our immediate part of the county was Bro Pyle from Lacombe local, Bros. F L Smith and Orland Zeak from Aberdeen local, and Bro Ch Wert of Crabtree Local and my self from Richardson Gap local.

The work of the Convention was mostly Educational and reformatory in its work. All phases of farm work, markets and farm products were discussed at some length by different speakers. Many questions on Legislation was up for discussion in the interest of the farmers. The Legislative Committee appointed by the Convention to meet with the coming session of the Oregon Legislature were instructed to labor with that body for retrenchment and reform, first last and all the time in all branches of the legislature affecting taxation.

The Committee on taxation, recommended some very good measures for the Legislature Committee to-day before that body, at its coming session, among which are the following: 1st. The Legislature to amend our road tax laws permitting farmers to work out one half of the road tax assessment and half to be paid in cash instead of paying all in cash as is now the law. 2nd That the time for collecting the general County and State tax be changed to June 1st and January 1st of each year, one-half collected June 1st and one-half January 1st, and no re-bates, penalties or costs be allowed in any way attached to the collecting of taxes unless actual suit is required. 3rd That a more systematic method of assessments be made on tangible and intangible property and the rate of taxes be made higher on intangible than on tangible property when not given in to the assessor.

I laid some measures before the Committee on Legislation which they said they would lay before the State body when convened: the first being that Flouring Mill men be allowed only 12 lbs instead of 20 lbs per bushel for grinding the farmers wheat, 1-5 instead of 3 or 50 per cent instead of 32 1/2 which they get now. 2nd That our school laws be so amended as to permit all grades above the 8th up to and including the 12th be taught in our rural public schools and the public school fund be so proportioned so as to meet this requirement. 3rd That the grade work in Rural County Schools is incompatible to the grade work in city schools and hinders rather than helps the progress of the rural district, pupils and teachers should be eliminated from them and classification of ability rather than grades be had instead. 4th That all education in our public schools be conducted along useful and practical lines rather than for name and impracticable courses of study.
