Oregon News Notes

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

One of the plausible things to come before the legislature is a state institution for the care of crippled children.

Canby—Three new residences under construction and three more planned.

The Oregon Blue Sky Law, one of the clubs to keep capital out of Oregon, has been upheld by the Supreme court.

Eugene-Socialists are initiating a bill for a large municipal market.

Newport—Ed Stocker will remove a saw mill plant from Philomath to near this place.

The resources of Oregon and Agriculture education are to be advanced by an O A C college quartet going east to give concerts.

The Cottage Grove tax levy is 12 mills less than 1914.

The Southern Pacific shops have re-opened at three places employing 1200 men.

The program of the Multomath delegation to cut off a million dollars of fixed charges will reduce state taxes one mill.

Eugene—Lane county tax levy reduced three mills and \$108,399 out for budget.

Irving farmers are boosting the sugar beet industry.

Springfield tax levy reduced 5.4 mills.

A C Ruby, Portland stock man builds \$25,000 residence.

Condon—Bids being taken for new Congregational church.

The attempt to collect nearly \$50 liability insurance from a man erecting a \$1,000 house at Portland shows what a state system costs.

Albany—W B Glafke established a branch wholesale horse here.

Oregon canneries report a good market for their products, but will ask relief from restriction.

It is estimated the one-board plan of business administration in place of six commissions for higher education institutions in Oregon would save half a million.

Plans are complete for the \$1000,000 hotel to be erected by Mayor Simpson and associates at North Bend.

Richland—Drs. Sanders and Eastland will build a general hospital.

Guy Laffollette is the new owner of the Crook County Journal at Prineville.

Baker—This city spent \$200,000 on new buildings in 1914.

The North Bend Manufacturing Co. is getting out \$15,000 myrtle wood novelties for the Panama Fair.

Three new bridges on the Columbia highway to Astoria will cost \$40,000.

Baker county mining output for 1914 was \$1,500,000.

Tax reproduction in Polk county amounts to \$116,901 below 1914.
