Letter from Dr White

As there has been considerable discussion relative to the need of a city health officer, the following letter from the state health officer to Dr Prill is given:

Portland, February 12, 1915
Dr A G Prill, Scio Oregon,

Dear Dr Prill:—

I am returning herewith the ordinance of the city of Scio. In my opinion the whole thing is not operative for the reason that the health officer is the executive member of the board and in this instance you have none. Further no municipality, county or community could require anyone to serve without pay. Then, with this in view I would say, (1) In case families are quarantined, it is your duty to inform the county health officer. (2) The law says that in families quarantined, food, provisions and medical attention must be furnished by the city or county in which they live if unable to provide for themselves. (3) In the absence of a city health officer, it is the duty of a county health officer. (4) You are not required to make a visit to families without pay. If the county health officer is called over from Albany, it would be absolutely with the county court what remuneration would be made for his expenses. This, I think, answers the questions in your letter.

The only sane and sensible thing for a city the size of yours to do, is to pay a health officer, say a salary of \$150 a year, and he can earn that much in cleaning up the sanitary conditions of the town. I think, however, physicians would do well to allow people to have a little experience and thoroughly acquaint themselves with these things through experience.
