truth. I am glad that we have arrived

men by the work they accomplish; as
the tree is judged by its fruit. By
that measure every honest man is will-
ing to be measured and by that
measure every honest man should
measure others.

I hope no man's fealty to his party
will prevent him from hearing and
knowing the truth. I believe that
masses of the people are honest and
want to know the truth and do right.

It is said we have five senses; name-
ly, seeing, hearing, smelling, tasting
and feeling. That used to do, but that
won't answer the purpose now, you
will have to go deeper down into your-
self to diagnose conditions and learn
the truth. Any fool can see, hear,
smell, taste and feel. A mule is equip-
ped that well.

If you have voted the Democratic
