**Youngs Quitting
Business Sale**

One of the oldest mercantile firms in
the Northwest will end their mercantile
career in Albany, after a half century
of continuous business. The young

sold and the stock will be disposed of
at special sale.

The transfer of this big business was

the store was bought outright by
