Bad Check Artist Taken

In Justice of the Peace Swan's court this morning Ray Pearl was bound over to the circuit court on \$2000 for forgery. Sheriff Bodine went to Shelburn Friday and placed the prisoner under arrest.

On March 23 Pearl took a check for \$125 bearing the signature of C L Davis and payable to A L Austin, to the Brownsville bank. The check was drawn on the First National Bank of this city and bearing the name of Davis, who is a prominent farmer near Shedd's, there was no question asked as to the worthiness of the check. It was properly endorsed by Austin and signed by Pearl.

Upon the receipt of the check by the local bank it was found to be a forgery and the Brownsville bank and the officers were notified and warnings sent out. Yesterday O A Archibald, cashier of the First National Bank, received word that Pearl was in Shelburn and just leaving down the track Mr Archibald called up the creamery at Shelburn and two men, went after Pearl and held him until the arrival of Mr Archibald and Sheriff Bodine, who made a record run to Shelburn in an automobile. Pearl pleaded not guilty and is being held under \$2000 bonds—Albany Democrat.

Pearl spent considerable time around Scio the past few weeks, claiming to be a Southern Pacific engineer. He gave the name of Robert Wilson to the writer and broached us carefully on the subject of cashing a check for him which he said the Scio bank would not take for lack of proper identification. It was suggested to him that he let the bank put the check through the regular channel, but this did not seem to meet with much enthusiasm on his part.

Miss Nelda Wendt who has been in poor health for some time left Monday morning, accompanied by her mother, for Bridgeport, eastern Oregon, where she hopes the change will prove beneficial. They expect to be gone several months, and in the meantime the News will keep them posted on Scio happenings.
