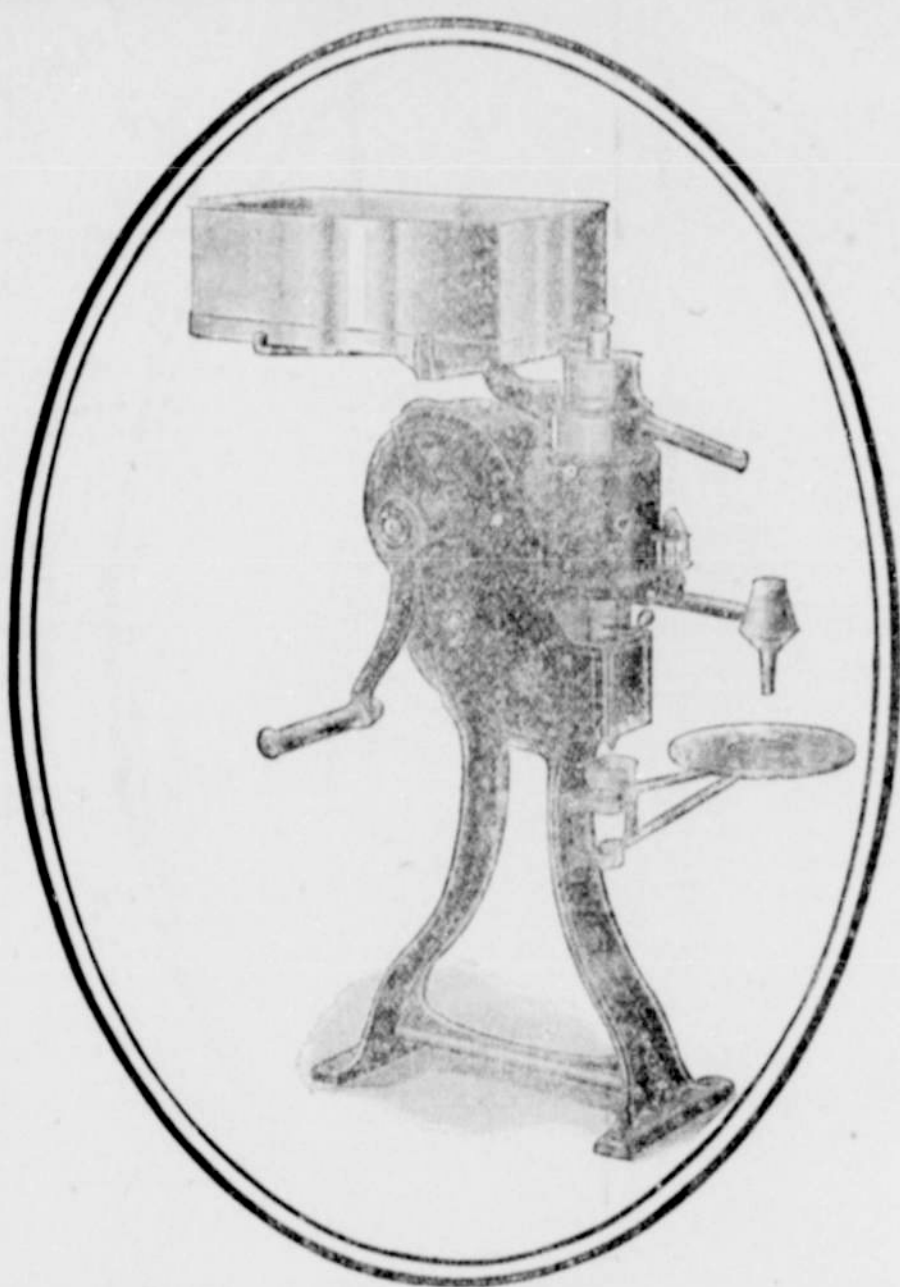

Grants Pass—Twohy Bros. have contract to complete railroad to Crescent City, Calif. To cost \$5,000,000.
