### GETTING A NEW HAT.

One Woman's Way That Other People Did Not Appreciate.

"I was in a fashionable hat shop in Fifth avenue the other day," said a New York woman of calm judgment, "and saw a little incident that was quite new to me and no less interesting.

"I had gone in, I may admit, because there were some marked down hats in the window that were worth the money and worth the looking at. I had been in the shop before and knew one of the clerks by name, but no one came to see what I wanted, and I was rather annoyed by it.

"On the counter near me lay a woman's hat showing signs of wear, and I had noticed as I came near the store a woman in the doorway going out. When the clerk came to me finally I told her as I nodded at the hat on the counter that somebody had gone and forgotten her old hat.

"She smiled wanly and said that was what was disturbing the usually serene atmosphere of the place, because after the woman had gone the hat was noticed and the trouble began. I said I didn't see why they should bother, because the woman would come back when she discovered she had left her hat. The clerk smiled wanly again and said she hoped she would, but the fact was that the woman wouldn't come back because she had walked out with a brand new hat and the old one had been left as no longer of use.

"What she had forgotten or neglected to do was to pay for it, and the clerk at that counter would have to pay for a new hat for somebody else, according to a rule of the shop. As the hat was worth \$20 or more it became a serious matter to the clerk who was responsible for it.

"This was by no means the first time such a game had been played, and because there was no other way to protect the shop the rule had been established to make every clerk doubly watchful and prevent if possible such thefts. ### The Stone Tree.

There is a tree which grows in Mexico called the "chijol," or stone tree. It is of enormous proportions, both in circumference and height. It has a number of branches spreading out widely and carrying leaves of a yellowish green color. The wood is extremely fine and easily worked in a green state. It is not given to either warping or splitting. The wonderful part about it is that after being cut the wood gets gradually harder and in the course of a few years it is absolutely petrified, whether left in the open air or buried in the ground. From this timber houses can be built that would in a few years become completely fireproof and would last as though built of stone.

### Persian Prayer Rugs.

About 200 years ago small embroidered rugs were largely made in Persia, chiefly at Ispahan. These were prayer rugs, and on each of them near one end was a small embroidered mark to show where the bit of sacred earth from Mecca was to be placed. In obedience to a law of the Koran, that the head must be bowed to the ground in prayer, this was touched by the forehead when the prostration was made, and so the letter of the law was carried out. The custom still prevails. The Persian women who weave the finest prayer rugs seldom weave any other kind of rug.
