A Drop of Water.
A gallon of distilled water weighs
8.339 pounds, and, their being four
quarts to the gallon, and two pint-
to the quart, and sixteen fluid
ounce to the pint, and two table-
-spoonfuls to the fluid ounce, and

and forty-five drops to the teaspoon,
a drop of water weighs 0.00018057
pound, or slightly more.
