South-Stoddard Concert Monday night

Music lovers are looking forward with much pleasure to the coming violin and piano recital to be given at Scio on Monday evening, June 7. Mr South will be assisted by Annette Stoddard, pianiste of Portland, and the program will be a real musical treat. These young artists have appeared in the larger cities of this country and abroad, and have been the recipients of many flattering press accounts.

From the fact that Mr South is a native of this vicinity where he spent his early boyhood, a large attendance is anticipated. He studied in leading Eastern music centers and continued his studies for a protracted period with great masters in Europe.

Mrs Stoddard has studied in leading music centers and has been at the head of several large Eastern college schools of music. She has for the past two years been organist at the Trinity Episcopal and White Temple churches in Portland, and has but recently returned from San Francisco where she appeared in recital on the exposition organ, which is one of the largest in the world. She will be heard in a group of piano numbers and her accompaniments are wonderful. The Portland Oregonian recently said of her: "She accompanied with great skill, and her piano numbers were a source of great pleasure to all who were fortunate in hearing them."

New School Law

Supt. Jackson has called the attention of the News to the following school law as passed by the last legislature:

By an act of the last legislature, school districts maintaining high school grades, shall publish a notice of each annual or special meeting or election in one or more newspapers published in the district, at least two weeks before such meeting is held, and in case no newspaper is published in such district the clerk shall post said notice on the door of the school house in such district.

The district clerk of any district, at least two weeks before a meeting is held for the purpose of levying taxes, is required to publish in one or more newspapers published in the district, a budget statement of the estimated amount of revenue required for the ensuing year, and in districts in which no paper is published, the clerk shall post such budget on the door of the school house in said district at least ten days before such meeting.

Postal Savings

The News is in receipt of a circular setting forth that every person in the United States, ten years of age or older, may open a Postal Savings Account after July 1. Those living in sparsely settled communities where there are no Postal Savings Banks, may open accounts by mail with the nearest postoffice designated as a Postal Savings Bank.

This important extension of the service will prove a great convenience to the public. Further information may be had from the local postmaster, Miss Daisy Buckner.
