To Taxpayers of Road District  
No. 16

The money to be expended on  
the roads of this district as given  
by the County Clerk is as fol-  
lows: The valuation of road dis-  
trict 16 on the 1914 tax roll  
amounts to \$479,443.00; at 2 1/2  
mills amounts to \$1,198.61.  
Overdraw January 1, \$157.98;  
March warrants for 1914 work,  
\$485.70; total overdraw \$643.68.  
Special tax for 1914, balance on  
hand January 1, 1915, \$230.20;  
March warrants for 1914 work,  
\$26.77. This leaves a balance  
of \$748.36 for 1915 road work.

As we have such a small  
amount to keep the roads in re-  
pair it would be greatly appre-  
ciated if those who have wood  
or lumber to haul would do so  
before the rainy season.
