Eugene—Pacific Telephone Co will expend \$15,000 on two-wire line to Florence.

Two Pioneers Pass

Two of Scio's honored citizens were claimed by death this week in the passing of John Gill and James Richardson.

John Gill, who had been a sufferer from heart trouble for several months, died at his home in Scio Monday evening.

Mr Gill was a man of sterling worth, loved and respected by all who knew him. His friends and relatives have watched with pain, mingled with admiration, his heroic fight the past few months against the grim reaper, who has at last claimed him.

The funeral services were held at the Christian church of which deceased was a member, Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock, and interment was made in the Franklin Butte cemetery.

James Richardson died at his home south of town early Tuesday morning. He had been a great sufferer from a cancer on his hip for several years.

Mr Richardson was one of the pioneer residents of this community, a kind and loving neighbor and a good citizen, and his departure is mourned alike by his relatives and a large circle of friends.

The funeral services were held from the home Wednesday morning at ten o'clock, and interment was made in the Franklin Butte cemetery.
