Obituary

Alexander Montgomery was born in Mercer county, Pa. April 22, 1832, and died at his home near Scio June 21, 1915 at the age of 83 years and 2 months. He left his father's home in Pa. at about the age of 14 years, and went on a sailing vessel to New Orleans; from there he went to California, remaining there until 1859 when he came to Oregon and settled in Jackson county; from there he moved with his wife and eldest daughter to Linn County where he has continuously resided, living in Scio a portion of this time and the remainder on different farms in this vicinity.

He has one brother surviving B. C. Montgomery of Asotin, Wash. He was married in July, 1860 to Lydia T. Hamilton. To this union 12 children were born, 5 having preceded their parents to their last resting place; 7 surviving are Mrs. R. Shelton of Scio, Mrs. T. W. Dilley, of Oroville, Cal., Mrs. W. F. Snyder of Vancouver, Wash., Mrs. A. D. Elder of Shedd, and C. A. Riley W and the youngest daughter, Leone Montgomery, at the home who cared for their aged father in a commendable and christian manner in his long illness and last days on earth. His faithful wife passed away in June 1907.

He united with the Missionary Baptist church at Providence about 40 years ago, and was at the time of his death a member of the Baptist church at Scio. He had been a cripple for more than 35 years, and most of this time was unable to walk without the assistance of a cane or crutches, and for the past year had to be moved about the home in a rocking chair, but during all the time of his sickness and disability, he was cheerful and enjoyed life and always had a welcome smile and a hearty handshake for his dear children and friends.

Mr. Montgomery was a man of strong mind and character, desiring to have his children and everyone be righteous and of a clean strong character, his hope and faith was centered in Jesus Christ, the Savior of the world.

He leaves a large circle of neighbors, friends and relatives to mourn his decease, but we say of our dear Christian neighbor and father he is relieved of the ills of this life and has gone to that everlasting life of peace and joy, and that his life has been a blessing on earth, and now we say farewell.
