Farmers Attention

On account of a recent ruling of hog packers of North Portland on the grading of hogs, no hogs lighter than 150 lbs and thoroughly finished will be accepted by them at market quotations. Hereafter, all hogs will be graded on a dressed product basis, the same as in eastern markets, and no half fat hogs will be bought by them at any price.

This forces the shippers to grade in the country. To help the farmers who have hogs on hand to be fattened before harvest, The Scio Produce Co. has made arrangements in Portland to get rolled barley at jobbing prices and are selling it at cost, with a slight margin added for cost of handling at West Scio. We are getting a car this week that costs the farmer \$28.50 per ton, sacks included, 28 sacks to the ton. This barley is standard rolled and an excellent hog fattener. [Adv.]

Get Rid of Gophers

A farmer tells us that he has practically rid his farm of gophers by the use of gasoline. He carries a bottle and a bunch of cotton batting with him while at work in the field and when he sees a gopher run into a hole he pours some gasoline upon a wad of cotton and places it at the mouth of the hole and covers the opening with dirt. The gas fumes are heavier than air and go to the bottom of the hole. In an attempt to get air, the gopher comes to the top of the hole, and here the gas does the rest. Remove cotton in about half an hour and Mr Gopher will be dead. The plan will apply to many other burrowing animals.
