Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

On July 13 the first full wagon load of hogs ever seen in Hood River appeared on the street.

The Supreme Court has handed down a decision absolving the O W R & N Co from liability to trespassers.

Portland iron manufacturers soon may be engaged in the task of making shrapnel for the European armies.

The Oregon Power Co at Albany is offering free electric fan including fan service for the benefit of seriously sick.

Pendleton will have a \$25,000 Carnegie Library.

140 men are busy laying track on the Willamette Pacific from the bridge north on Coos Bay.

Marion county is laying about 20,000 yards of hard surface pavement.

The politician will soon be out with his promises of what he will do if elected, and oh how tired we get of hearing them. Impress upon these servants of the people that we want lower taxes, less industry killing regulation and more encouragement to capital to enter the state.

At Portland 1800 tons Colorado marble will be used on the First National bank to cost \$400,000.

Pacific Telephone Co rebuilding its plant at Pendleton.

Blumauer-Frank Drug Co of Portland has started a move to establish drug farms for raising different drug plants.

Exposition News

Oregon Building, Panama-Pacific Exposition, July 14—August 9th to 16th inclusive is to be "All Oregon Week" at the Oregon building, and it is certain a magnificent week's program will be worked out. It is expected that several Oregon bands and marching organizations will be here at that time and that many of Oregon's distinguished citizens will be here to participate in one way and another. The Oregon building will be gayly decorated, there will be parades through the grounds and other buildings, and the Exposition is co-operating to the extent of providing special fireworks and advertising the week far and wide. Oregonians will find this week of interest extraordinary.

July 29 is Loganberry Day at the Oregon Building. Loganberry juice made at the plant that was once the Salem Brewing Company's establishment, will be served to all comers, and preparation is made for at least 10,000. Small quantities of the juice and Oregon prunes have been served at different times and are in tremendous favor. It is believed that the loganberry juice, properly exploited, will develop a business requiring all the loganberries the state of Oregon can raise. There will be an all day program on July 29.

The Willamette and Rogue River valleys sent quantities of cherries, and some of them wonders, but Hood River sent the box of the largest cherries shown at the exposition. These were Lamberts and of a size unbelievable to those unfamiliar with the size to which Oregon cherries grow. Hood River has a right to make a big noise.

The crowds are rapidly increasing at this time, and the Exposition is filled with Easterners. Inquiry about Oregon has trebled and undoubtedly many thousands will visit our state during the next two or three months. An average of 55,000 pass the gates daily and the Exposition is now making good money. Oregon visitors to the fair are increasing in numbers, about 175 registering daily. Many Oregonians are coming by auto and find the roads generally satisfactory. Constant inquiry here makes it certain that Oregon is going to be visited by an extraordinary number of touring autoists during the summer and fall months.
