'50's and it is an interesting
fact that he was the first man to
buy a pair of overalls of S E
Young when he opened a store
here. Mrs Donahue died a year
or two ago. A family of seven
children survive him: Mrs Ged-
ney, Miss Margaret, of the Ham-
ilton store of this city; Mrs
Abrahamson of Hequiam; Mrs
Kyle of Corvallis; Mrs E R Feller
of Aurora; Mrs Gibbons of Shel-
burn; C L, Kate and Kelly Don-
ahue of the home place.

The funeral service will be
held at Jefferson tomorrow
morning at ten o'clock when
Father Lane of this city will

Bryan at Albany To- morrow

The date of W J Bryan's
speech at Albany has been post-
poned to tomorrow, Friday, af-
ternoon at one o'clock, when the
Commoner will be heard at
Chautauqua Park.

It is expected that immense
crowds will flock to Albany to
hear him, as he will only make
one other speech in the state on
this trip, at Portland. The
committee in charge have com-
pleted arrangements for handling
the crowd and will be able to
park 600 autos at the Chautau-
qua grounds.

third has been granted on all

ville and Woodburn on the north
to Eugene on the south, and on
the Corvallis & Eastern from
Hoover to Newport.

kers at 10:48 a m and 7:04 p m.
