## Farmers Attention

On account of a recent ruling  
of hog packers of North Port-  
land on the grading of hogs, no  
hogs lighter than 160 lbs and  
thoroughly finished will be ac-  
cepted by them at market quotat-  
ions. Hereafter, all hogs will  
be graded on a dressed product  
basis, the same as in eastern  
markets, and no half fat hogs  
will be bought by them at any  
price. This forces the shippers  
to grade in the country.

Farmers should be very care-  
ful in handling hogs in hot  
weather. Feeding in morning of  
day they are hauled to station  
should be omitted. Any hogs  
coming in overheated caused by  
feeding, will be cut in price one-  
half cent per pound.

## Robert Wade Dead School Opens Sep- tember 20

Robert Wade is dead. The  
word flew over town about ten  
o'clock Monday morning as on  
the wings of wind. Wherever it  
touched it left sorrow, and the  
expressions of sympathy for the  
bereaved ones were many and  
from the heart.

Bright, happy and cheerful,  
Robert carried sunshine with  
him wherever he went, with al-  
ways a smile and a pleasant  
word for his friends. His death  
comes as a dark shadow to  
friends and to his relatives, who  
loved him so dearly.

It is sad to give up one whose  
influence among men would  
doubtless have been for good;  
but He who doeth all things well  
makes no mistakes. The human  
link snapped assunder on earth  
is forged anew in Heaven.

Robert Copeland Wade was  
born in Minneapolis, Minn, Octo-  
ber 21, 1894 and died at the  
home of his parents in Scio,  
August 2, 1915, aged 20 years,  
9 months and 11 days. About a  
month ago he was taken sick,  
but rallied for a time and his  
condition was not considered  
serious until about two weeks  
ago when his doctor pronounced  
the disease typhoid-malarial  
fever. Everything that loving  
hands and medical skill could do  
for him proved of no avail, how-  
ever, and at ten o'clock Monday  
morning he gently fell asleep.  
He leaves to mourn his loss his  
father, his mother, two sisters,  
grandmother and a host of  
friends.

Short funeral services were  
conducted at the home Tuesday  
afternoon at two o'clock by J M  
Meiklejohn, and a large con-  
course of sorrowing friends fol-  
lowed the remains to their last  
resting place at Franklin Butte  
cemetery.
