The Columbia Highway between Astoria and Portland was opened to travel today.

Millions of Norwegian herring came into Siuslaw Bay for the first time in eight years.

Douglas County Fair will be held September 15, 16 and 17.

The general cry in both Washington and Oregon seems to be for lower taxes and less laws and regulations that hamper development and drive capital away.

Portland Woolen Mills plans to increase its force 20 per cent in anticipation of large orders.

Reports say Hood River apple crop will be short 30 to 40 per cent this year.

Scenic highway to rim of Crater Lake has been finished.

Salem Commercial Club is working to establish a broom factory at Salem.

The Newport Ice & Fish Co recently made a shipment of ten tons of halibut to Portland.

C A Parker representing New York capitalists is reported to be leasing land for oil test purposes in Coos county.

There has been talk of a shoe factory locating in Salem.

A \$100,000 Mausoleum will be erected in Portland.

Sixty-three lumber cargoes left Astoria in July with a total of 46,857,094 feet including rafts.

At Medford 12,000 acres have been signed up for an irrigation project.

Pendleton has commenced the construction of a \$9,000 steel bridge.

A \$2,000 swimming establishment is completed at Eugene.

Eugene's 2,500,000 gallon reservoir will be ready for use August 15, according to reports.

The Pacific Mail Steamship Co has made definite announcement that it will cease operation on November 2 as it is impossible to run after the new Seaman's Bill goes into effect. Five liners will be withdrawn. This latest experimental law leaves the Japs with a clear field on the Pacific for foreign shipping. Nice isn't it for our coast industries?

Teachers Institute

County School Superintendents Jackson of Linn, and Cannon of Benton, have a big task before them. They have to round up 400 school teachers before September 13, when the annual institute of the two counties will convene here for a three days' session. That the teachers are scattered to the four winds on vacations and on visits with parents and friends is the conclusion of Mr Jackson following the receipt of several letters from school board clerks giving the addresses of teachers.

The reason the county superintendents have to round up the 400 teachers is due to the fact that a new system in regard to holding the institute was inaugurated this year. Instead of having the institute in the Fall it was decided to have it just before school opened to avoid having to close them during the term. The state law requires that such institutes be held once a year and makes it compulsory that every teacher attend. As the local school officials didn't decide to hold this year's institute before school opens until recently, every teacher will have to be located and notified.—Albany Herald.
