Mrs Barrett Blodgett came up from Eugene on a visit to her sister, Mrs Geddes. Mr and Mrs B. lived at Jordan once upon a time. It may be of interest to many of the News readers who knew him to say that he was a pioneer of the pioneers. When young he came with the gold seekers to California in 1849; went back with some money and remained awhile. He made a second hike overland and came to Oregon where he owned and ran a grist mill at or near Baker City for a time; he then returned to Glenwood, Minn. and built and owned another flouring mill. Again he came across with mule teams. After leaving Jordan he freighted at Lake Okanagon, Wash. He finally bought a farm near Eugene and dropped dead one morning while sawing wood. He lived the simple life.
