C. A. Warner Dead

Charles A Warner died at Portland last Friday morning of cancer. Although he was far from well for the past year, his last illness was only of three months duration. He was taken to Portland June 10, when the doctors announced that the disease was cancer and held out no hope for recovery.

The remains were brought to Scio Sunday and the funeral services were held at the Christian church about 1:30 p.m. conducted by Rev Geselbracht of Albany and the Knights of Pythias, of which order he had been a member for over twenty-five years, holding his membership in the Laurel Lodge of Albany. The remains were interred in the Franklin Butte Masonic cemetery.

He was married December 29, 1890 to Miss Jennie Young, who survives him. Besides a devoted wife he leaves a father, George P Warner of Scio, three sisters and one brother, namely: Mrs Riley Waller and Will Warner of Albany, Mrs Don Byland of Shedd and Mrs Ben Barker of Portland.

Mr Warner was born April 5, 1865, at Au Sable, Michigan. He came to Oregon with his parents in the fall of 1877. He was manager of the Scio Milling Company for over twenty years, and was without a doubt the best liked and most popular man in this part of the country.

A friend of Mr Warner has handed in the following verse, which is very fittingly descriptive of his last illness:

"Thank God for the man who is cheerful
In spite of life's troubles I say,
Who sings of a bright tomorrow,
Because of the clouds of today.
His life is a beautiful sermon,
And this is the lesson to me—
Meet trials with smiles and they vanish;
Face cares with a song and they flee."

His death has brought the bitter cup of sorrow to friends and relatives. His was a heart of gold. He was one of nature's noblemen in its truest sense—brave, generous, manly. His was the soul of honor, and his friends and friendships were sacred to him.

It was the writer's good fortune to have known Mr Warner for nearly four years, and we only knew him to esteem him more highly as the years passed by. Today we miss his kindly smile and friendly greeting; we long in vain to hear the ring of his jovial laughter and to feel again his genial presence. His cheerful, helpful life, his devotion to his wife and relatives, and kindness to everybody will long linger as a fragrant memory in the home which his presence brightened and which death has now darkened. Though he is gone his record has been made and will remain with us a lasting treasure. His life was gentle, but like the still waters it was deep. In his heart of hearts he carried those he loved and his hand was never weary, his step never failed in caring for and ministering to those who were in any way dependent upon him.

We can only remind his sorrowing loved ones that he is not dead—he is only asleep—resting after a well spent

Model Health Law

State Health Officer, Dr D N Roberg of Portland was here last Friday arranging for putting into effect the new model health law passed at the last session of the legislature.

The new law provides for the appointment of local registers in various parts of the counties. Linn county is divided into eight districts as follows: Albany, Lebanon, Scio, Harrisburg, Halsey, Brownsville, Mill City and Sweet Home.

Dr A G Prill has been appointed register of the Scio district which is composed of North and South Scio, Shelburn Kiegeston, Providence and Jordan precincts. The law became operative in Linn county last Monday.

In accordance with the provisions of the new law every doctor, midwife and undertaker must register his name with the local register of his district and report every birth and death to him. They in turn report to the state health officer directly. The bill makes it necessary for every undertaker to apply for a burial permit before the remains can be disposed of, and before the permit can be issued the undertaker must present a death certificate signed by the doctor attending the patient at the time of death. It is also necessary for people in a district to report a death within 72 hours to the local register.

Regarding births, it is necessary for residents of a district to report to their register within ten days when a child is born. Under the new law an exact record of all births and deaths will be kept, a thing that has not been done in the past.

The system is new in the United States, but has been in use in Europe for over a century. Oregon is the fifteenth state to adopt the law.

Dr Clifford Epley of Salem conducted the singing at the C A Warner funeral Sunday. He was at one time a resident of Scio and for many years a close friend of the deceased.
