Father (Sig Miller) is the lad to catch fish. He doesn't tell how many he catches, but delivers the goods to show for themselves.

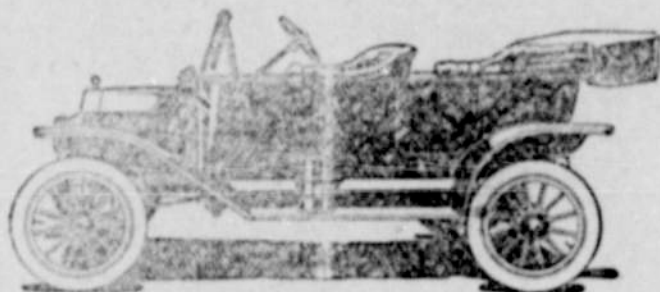
John Bilyeu and wife were Crabtree visitors last week.
