Simpson Lumber Co. of North Bend made the largest cut on record in September for a North Bend mill, 3,415,650 feet.

The North Pole and Columbia mines at Sumpter now working steadily with good prospects.

Veneta will have a sawmill in the near future.

Oregon City has a new bank, \$50,000 capital.

It is announced that construction will begin at once on standard gauge railroad from Carnes Station 6 miles south of Roseburg to the big quarries of the Portland Cement Co. on Roberts creek.

It is rumored that the Smith Pulp Mill at Marshfield will run soon.

Morrison Wins Suit

Mr and Mrs N I Morrison, Mr and Mrs Roy V Shelton, J F Kukaeka, W J Chromy and Harry Johnston went to Eugene Monday, Mr Morrison of the hardware store, and Kukaeka & Chromy of the planing mill being the plaintiffs in a lawsuit, and the others going as witnesses. The suit was brought against the Russells who run a piling camp near here last year and involves several hundred dollars worth of property. E C Shelton and J F Prochaska run the hardware store, and Tony Stueck the planing mill during their absence.

Later—The party returned home Wednesday evening, and Mr Morrison won his suit against the Russells, obtaining judgment and the costs of the suit, which will total from \$600 to \$800. The trial lasted two days and about 35 witnesses were examined.

Vandals at Work

Seventy-two four year old peach trees in an orchard of 76 on the A W Martin farm on the Santiam river east of the city, fell down Saturday, says the Albany Herald, and an investigation developed that they had been sawed so that the first wind would blow them down. Only four trees are left standing.

Mr Martin is broken hearted and says he hasn't the slightest idea who is responsible for the crime. He figured the trees would bring \$5 apiece next year and had planned to use the money to take care of a mortgage.

Since the news of a similar incident at Crabtree Saturday night reached the city some are inclined to believe that persons possessed with a mania for the destruction of property may be responsible.

W J Turnidge, the Crabtree merchant and mint dealer, was the victim in the second incident. Unknown parties entered his barn at Crabtree Saturday night and with a sharp knife completely ruined a \$65 set of double harness by cutting it to pieces. It was brought to a local harness maker Monday morning, but was found to be too badly cut for repairing. It had been wantonly cut into small pieces. The leath on the inside of the horse collar had been sliced several times and the heavy tugs and other parts had been cut into small bits.

Like Mr Martin, Mr Turnidge is unable to figure who is responsible. He intimated, however, that it might have been someone who held a grudge against him, though he doesn't have an idea who it could have been.
