## MAYOR'S ANNUAL MESSAGE

To City Council and City Budget for 1916

TO THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SCIO

GREETING: You have been placed in the position which you now occupy by the will of the citizens of Scio, to have charge of and conduct the affairs of this Municipality for the coming year.

To properly fulfill your obligation will require of each of you, not only that you are prompt in attending all meetings of this body, but also time and labor and some sacrifice from private business in order to accomplish the work before you. With this in view I shall outline to you and call your attention to a few important matters for your consideration,

#### Law and Order

Scio for loud and bosterous talking, swearing, the use of indecent language and intoxications, at all hours of the day and night. It should be seen to all other ordinances providing for the standing against it which does not citizens of Scio.

#### Electric Light and Water System

From reports I learn that owing to an inadequate dam in Thomas creek the power supply is not sufficient to operate the plant up to standard, even at this time of the year with an abundance of water in the stream. I would therefore, recommend an immediate investigation of this matter: first, as to securing additional water; second, the installation of either gas or steam power to operate the plant when the able; third, an inspection of all water mains, hydrants and fire apparatus and having them placed in first class condition, and if necessary, to pay for the service of some person to have the charge of and see that the fire apparatus is always in condition for immediate use.

### Streets and Public Property

Main street, the public thoroughfare through the city, has reached a deplorable condition and needs your atshould be secured for the grading of operating the plant. this street according to city grade and improvement of the same by crushed be placed on grade and according to ordinance.
