Rev. H B Iler of Scio was in the city Tuesday, when he filed his ordination certificate with the County Clerk, which permits him to perform marriage ceremonies in this state. Rev. Iler is pastor of the new federated church at Scio, coming here from Fort Supply, Okla, the fort built by Gen. Custer, and which continues to stand. He has been selected to take charge of the united work of the churches at Scio and has begun business. The movement is one being strongly advocated for small towns with several poorly paid ministers, one well supported church being better than many poorly supported organizations. — Albany Democrat.

Obituary

Francis Marion Alexander was born at Janesville, Wisconsin, August 12, 1840 and died at Portland, January, 13, 1916, aged 75 years, 5 months. He was a civil war veteran. Mr Alexander was married January 3, 1878, and came to Oregon in 1892. He leaves three children, a daughter in California, and Mrs J L Calavan and Otto Alexander of Scio, a sister in Santa Rosa, California, besides many friends to mourn his loss. The funeral services were conducted by J M Meiklejohn and interment made in the Franklin Butte cemetery.

Harney county is celebrating its first view of a locomotive and all that section is rejoicing that it will soon have a railroad.

Kruse & Banks ship yard, Marshfield, long idle, is now running full blast, working on a new steam schooner with prospects for several more orders before summer.

On account of radical and freak legislation and regulations, the great moving picture industry of Los Angeles is threatening on leaving that section of the country, and the Portland Commercial Club is making every effort to locate these large concerns in southern Oregon. Here is a chance for Oregon by some management and legislation to acquire a great industry. Let us all work to secure it.

Principal business of the Northwest for the past week has been shoveling snow.

Thirty-eight out of forty jitneys inspected under Portland ordinance failed to pass.

C A Smith Lumber Co at Marshfield will start on full time February 1.

Mangled Leg Result of Coon Hunt

Luther, the 19 year old son of John White of near Lacombe, met with a painful and serious accident last Sunday. He was out coon hunting with some companions, when they treed several coons and in order to reach them decided to cut the tree down. It did not fall in the direction the boys expected it to, and young White failed to get out of the way, although his companions shouted a warning to him. One leg was literally crushed to pieces from the knee to the foot, the doctors finding large pieces of the bones in the cloth of his trousers. The young man is resting as easy as could be expected under the circumstances. He is at the Parker hospital under the care of a trained nurse. The doctors fear an amputation may be necessary however, this will be determined in a few days.

Irritation and Pain.

A sharp distinction should be drawn between irritation and pain. Irritation is not pain, but only a frequent cause of it. Thus a crumb lodged in the larynx near the vocal cords produces violent irritation and prolonged coughing, which often results in actual pain. So, too, a speck of dust in the eye sets up violent irritation and inflammation, followed by actual pain. Of the surface of the body the finger tips and the end of the tongue are most sensitive—for instance, a burn on the fingers is much more painful than one on the back would be, while one on the tongue would be more painful still. Deep wounds are not painful, as a rule, save as regards the surface injury.

The King Snake.

To the rattlesnake and to every other dangerous snake, large or small, the king snake is a terror. The poison of a rattler has no more effect on him than so much moonshine. Instinctively the rattler knows his match and at sight of a king snake tries to escape if possible. In fight the king snake relies wholly upon his incredible speed. If the movements of an ordinary snake seem quick to the human eye, the movements of a king snake would seem instantaneous. In a twinkling the long, lank fellow has wound himself about the throat of an antagonist and, his sinewy coils closing about the other's throat, chokes the wind out of him.
