the foundation.

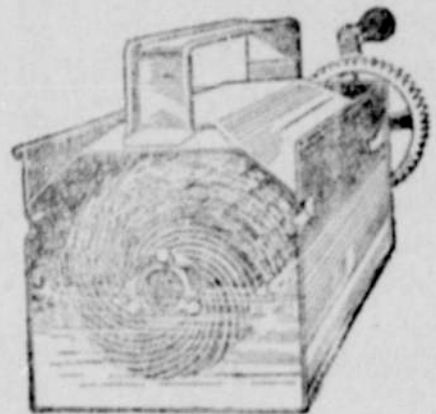
We have our German-
