Dear sir:—You may send the Santiam News to the address above. I landed in Butte March 19th, and took a position with the Royal Milling Co the 21st as foreman in their warehouse. Wages are good here and anyone can get work I think. Wages are not less than \$3.50 for 8 hours and as high as \$4.25 for common labor. The pay roll from the mines alone is more than two million dollars per month, so you can guess this is a lively town.

House rent is very high, but outside of that I can live cheaper than I can in Scio. I am well pleased with the change as I found it to be fine weather here, almost like summer.

Thomas Large, Sr.

Thomas Large was born in Nashville, Tenn., Dec. 25, 1839, and died March 26, 1916 at his home in Scio.

He left Tennessee in 1860 and was married to Lydia Workman in 1861 at Loami, Ill. They moved to Kansas in 1867, and came from there to Oregon in 1878, when they settled on a farm near Scio.

To them were born 12 children, six of whom have passed on before him. He is survived by his wife and the following children, all of whom were at his bedside during his illness: Mrs Tizah Campbell, Loami, Ill.; Mrs Frank Sharp, Corvallis; Mrs Wallace Hooye, Mill City; Mrs Vergil Hackleman, Albany; Glenn Large, Brownsville, and Thos Large, Scio.

Mr Large became a member of the Christian church over 40 years ago. His remains were laid to rest in the Franklin Butte Masonic Cemetery.

Fishing Season Opens April 1

The fishing season will open on April 1 and will continue until October 31, according to County Clerk Russell. With the approach of the season, many fishing licenses are being sold to residents in all sections of the county. Many applications are made by mail.

Women are not required to have licenses to fish; neither are Civil War veterans.

The law fixes the bag limit on trout over six inches as 75 fish or 50 pounds in any one day. The season is open all the year on trout over ten inches in length; also on bass, crappies, white fish, catfish and graylings.—Albany Herald.
