Mrs. A. E. Edwards, Deceased

Mattie Frances Edwards was born at Southwest City, Mo. September 30, 1885 and died at Lebanon Saturday, April 1, at 7:30 a. m. She is survived by her husband, A E Edwards, and two children, Orvel and Velma, two brothers, James Wann of Scio, at present in Joplin, Mo., Robert Wann of Okmulgee, Okla. and one sister, Alice Thomas of Keyser, Colorado.

Her last illness was of several weeks duration, and about two weeks before the end she was taken to Lebanon, where all the care that medical skill could apply and devise for her comfort were brought into play, but the fiat of Him who rules our in-comings and outgoings had been issued and the sufferer's spirit took its flight to that home the Christian believes is the fulfillment of the life everlasting.
