S B Cole and wife, Curtis Cole and wife of Kingston and John Neal and wife of Jordan were visitors at R C Pepperling's Sunday.

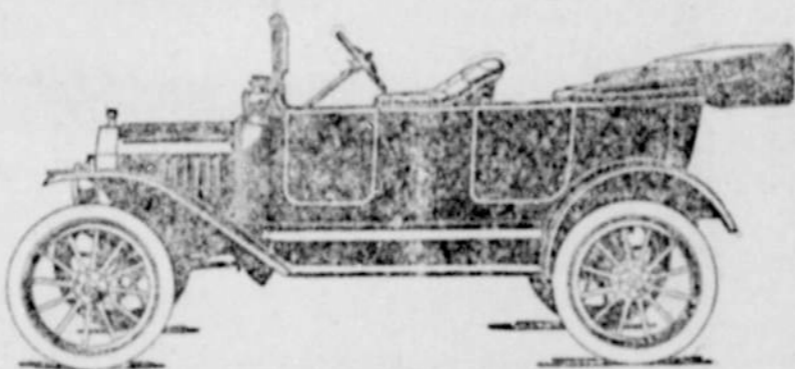
