What might have been a very serious auto accident happened at Went Station on the Woodburn-Springfield branch railroad last Thursday evening when the auto driven by Mrs. Holdridge of Painview, in company with her brother F. Mrs. Holdridge showed great presence of mind in turning the auto abruptly to the left so that the train just hit it, which act doubtless saved their lives.—Albany Democrat.

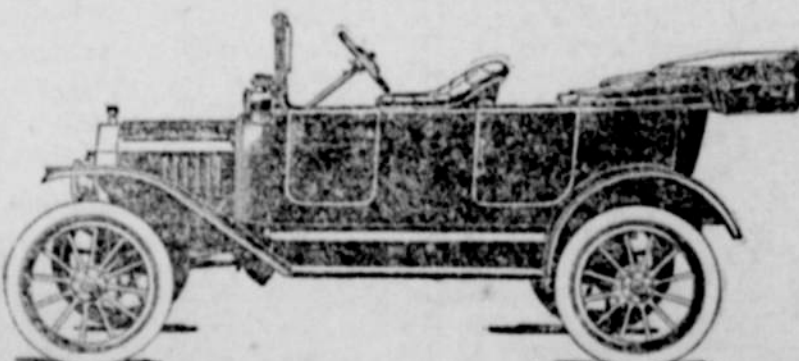
