Railroad Notes

The construction train of the S P is on the track. They have put cement bases under the DeFord creek bridge and evidently are preparing for heavy traffic.

The electric surveying crew is working near Niagara. The line runs through Kings Prairie and crosses Mad creek at the old blackberry camp grounds. Hundreds of people from the Forks have camped there. It misses Gates a mile.

The electric surveyors set permanent grade stakes on and across the Hammond Co's right of way for a distance of 30 rods. The Hammond Co have gone them one better and have set stakes on the same ground and are going to build a branch logging road in the opposite direction. The H Co's road will run west through what is known as the Dick Mayo or Shahan ranch to the "old burn" southwest of Mill City.

There is one railroad running and two surveyed through your humble servant's ranch, besides the county road runs alongside without any intervening space. One consolation, I may get the job of track despatcher to keep the trains from bumping into each other.

The leading officials of the S P went
