Peg O' My Heart

Peg o' My Heart, a comedy in
3 acts, by J Hartley Manners,
will be given at the People's
Theatre, May 24.

In this comedy, rich in human
appeal and delightful surprises,
the author has written a story of
a young girl, the daughter of an
aristocratic English mother and
an unsuccessful Irish Socialist.
Her mother died at her birth and
her father who, as Peg says dur-
ing the action of the piece,
"knows more about motherhood
than any man in the world,"
has raised her.

Peg's uncle, who has never
forgiven his sister for marrying
against his wishes, relents and
makes Peg his heiress, allowing
an income of 1,000 pounds a year
to any respectable family who
will undertake to educate her.

Her mother's sister, Mrs Chi-
chester, who had expected to in-
herit her brother's fortune, ac-
cepts the charge as they are in
need of money owing to the fail-
ure of their bank.

The Chichester's are a proud
selfish family and Peg is made
very unhappy in her new sur-
roundings. Her only friend is a
chum of her cousin Alaric,
known to her as Jerry, but who
turns out to be a nobleman.

Peg rescues the family from
disgrace by saving the daughter
from eloping with a married
man, and in an outburst of Irish
temper is going to return home,
when Jerry persuades her to stay.

It is a beautiful play of youth
and will be presented by the
Scio Dramatic Club for the bene-
fit of the Knights of Pythias
band Wednesday, May 24.

Portland-Alaska Steamship Co
starts line of steamers from
Portland to Alaska.

Two ships leave Columbia with
5,000,000 ft of lumber for China
and Australia.

Portland shipyard has con-
tracts aggregating \$4,000,000
and will employ about 1000 men.

Work started at Grants Pass
on construction of new planing
mill.

Dollar Logging camp on Bear
creek near Marshfield opens
with 40 men.

Contracts aggregating \$161,-
390.81 for permanent improve-
ment on streets in Astoria with
a bitulithic hard surface pave-

Inman-Poulsen mill, Portland,
cutting 300,000 ft of lumber in
