## Potter's Mill Burns

The sawmill and shingle mill of the Potter Lumber Company, one and one-half miles west of Mill City, were entirely destroyed by fire shortly after midnight Wednesday morning, with a loss of \$40,000. The loss is partly covered by insurance. The mill had a capacity of 65,000 feet of lumber and one car of shingles daily. It was running day and night and employed about 80 men in the mill and logging camps.
