Word From Dr. Prill

Mrs A G Prill received a telegram from Dr Prill last Saturday from his old home in New York, where he recently went on a visit, stating that his mother, his sister Mrs VanSlyke, and his niece Miss Nell VanSlyke, were all at the point of death, all under the same roof. Miss VanSlyke taught in the Scio High school two years, leaving here in 1914, and has a host of friends here who are shocked to hear of her serious condition. Dr Prill stated that she had been for several months in an open air sanitarium in the Adirondack mountains, but since his arrival there, has been taken home to die, in the last stages of tuberculosis, and in consequence the time of his leaving New York is uncertain. However he expects to stop off in Chicago a couple of weeks and take special hospital work in surgery, and hopes to reach home the last of this month.

Oregon News Notes

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

Figures compiled by Forest Service show that the furniture manufacturers of Oregon use annually nearly seven million feet of lumber, more than half of which is Douglas fir and maple.

Salmon cannery at Bandon will operate under new management.

Eugene company gets brick contract for Roseburg federal building and also for new Roseburg high school.

Timber interests considering construction of logging road from Dillard to tidewater on Coos Bay.

Large crew at work on electrification of West Side S P lines into Corvallis.

The new plant of the Albany Fruit Juice Co for the manufacture of a new drink from loganberry juice, has begun operations. The plant is modern in every respect and operated throughout by electricity furnished by the Oregon Power Co.

Reports received from nearly all sections of Douglas County indicate that this year's crop of prunes will far surpass previous years.

Coos Bay Times—"Close to three miles of track will be built by the Beuhner Lumber Co on North Coos river to tap their timber holdings in that section."

Construction of John Day Highway, which will connect the Columbia River Highway with the Lincoln Highway, will be started soon.

Wasco county cherry stems are being shipped to Europe to make poisonous gas that is used by opposing armies in France.

Warm Springs district will build large dam. Work started again on Sunset Oil well north of Vale.

Albany Furniture Co factory will be re-opened in about six weeks.

Getting Ready To Pave

The property owners on North Main St have got together this month and petitioned the city council to let them go ahead and improve the street. The old cross walks will be torn out at once, preparatory to going ahead with this work. Little work will be required to place this street on grade, and work is expected to progress very rapidly. It is proposed to use crushed rock and asphaltum, which will put the street in first class condition, on a par with many towns much larger than Scio. The same treatment is planned by the property owners on the south side of the bridge, for South Main street.
