He reports that his mother was some better and able to be up and around when they left, although 87 years of age. His sister, Mrs VanSlyke and her daughter, Miss Nell Van Slyke, are both at the point of death with no hope held out for their recovery.

Office Discontinued

Acting under the authority of the law passed by the 1915 legislature which makes it optional with the county board whether or not a supervisor shall be employed to assist the county school superintendent with his work of supervising the rural schools, the Linn county board consisting of A C Schmitt, J W Miller, Milton A Miller, W C Cooley and W L Jackson have decided to discontinue the services of a supervisor in this county.

This decision was reached after a poll of the school directors of the county had been taken, each director being requested to submit his ideas on the matter. As a result whoever the people elect for county school superintendent next November will have the work of supervising all the schools of the county.

Wool Pool Sold

The Farmers Union wool pool has been sold to M Sternberg & Co for 33 1-2 cents. The wool will be received at Lebanon on Wednesday and at West Scio on Thursday.

This pool, consisting of over 3000 fleeces, was offered at public sale last month but no bids were received. Two weeks ago a considerably better offer was made for the pool, but at the time the market looked strong and the offer was not accepted. However, in the face of present market conditions this price is not so bad.—Lebanon Express.

K. of P. Excursion

Running a special excursion train from Albany to Portland on the first of August, leaving here at 9 a m, the Knights of Pythias of this city are expecting to have a crowd of at least 200 people, perhaps more go down to the supreme lodge of the United States, the members of the lodges of Albany, Brownsville, Lebanon and perhaps Scio, taking part in the big parade, one of the largest ever held in the northwest. Any others who desire may go on the trip at the reduced rate, which will be \$3.10 for the round trip, good for several days, either a week or ten days, according to arrangements being made, but not yet completed as to the time limit. People desiring to take a trip up the Columbia will have plenty of time for the ride.—Democrat.
