Sent to Asylum

Douglas Hamilton of Scio, well known throughout the county as a street preacher and moving picture fan, was pronounced mentally unbalanced by Dr Robnett and Dr Davis this afternoon and ordered committed to the asylum.

Frequent complaints have been lodged against Hamilton charging him with showing signs of insanity, but no one took the matter into court until today.

During his examination by the doctors and the attorneys Hamilton admitted that he did not know what he was doing at times and thought it possible that he might be crazy. Although not considered violently insane it has been established that Hamilton is out of his head part of the time and some of the time is almost dangerous.

He will be taken to the asylum this evening and placed in the receiving ward until it has been determined in what part of the big hospital it will be best to place him. —Saturday Herald.
