Fish Used For Soap.

The angler or fishing frog, though nowhere common, seems more generally distributed around England's coasts than some authorities suppose. The angler is so called from the curious "rod and bait" formed by a modification of a ray of the front dorsal fin, which was formerly fancied to attract smaller fish, but the entire hideous body is a marvelous mimetic adaptation to the bottom of the sea, upon which the creature walks, using the pectoral fins for feet. Juggernaut.

The state allowance to the temple was suspended by the Indian government in 1851, and the festivals are growing less and less popular year by year.

Pendleton Normal School Proven Necessity

(Copied from Portland Oregonian.)

MONMOUTH, Ore., June 26.—The Oregon Normal school opened this week . . . students enrolled 785, largest on record for state Normal in Oregon . . . how to care for large student body a problem . . . 800 being crowded into auditorium with seating capacity of 550. Galleries filled with extra chairs in aisles. More than 150 students seated on platform. New boarding houses completed, additions to rooming houses built and tents used. One hundred girls sleep on upper floor of school.

The official school report gives 150 grade pupils in Monmouth, for teacher practice.
