### Two Good Men

James Van Winkle, chairman of the Linn County Republican Central Committee, has received a letter from George H. Barnett of the State Supreme Court regarding the two Republican candidates for Circuit Judge in this district, in which he strongly recommends the election of both Judge Kelly, who is up for re-election, and George G. Bingham, of Salem, who has been nominated as Judge Kelly's running mate, there being two positions open. The letter follows:

Salem, Or., Sept. 15, 1916.

Mr. J. S. Van Winkle, Albany, Or.

Dear Sir, There are two Circuit Judges to be elected next November in the judicial district composed of Linn and Marion counties. Percy R Kelly of Albany and George G Bingham of Salem, are candidates for these two positions. Having formerly held that office myself for eighteen years, I had good opportunity to observe their conduct as practicing lawyers. Without exception in either case, it was characterized by strict integrity and sound legal ability. Judge Kelly was elected six years ago and has demonstrated his fitness as a judge. His own record is his best recommendation. He has made good and ought to be re-elected.

I have known Mr Bingham since his early manhood. He was brought up in a sawmill and schooled to hard labor. He struggled hard to gain his legal education and carried his habits of industry into the practice of his profession. He has built up a large clientage by hard work and reliability. A standing such

as he has is not achieved in a night. It comes in time because people learn that they can depend upon the man. His clients represent many interests large and small, individual and corporate. The demagogue will object to him because he is often retained by corporations; but the

thinking voter will reflect that larger concerns will not employ either a knave or a fool. On the contrary they entrust their business to the man whose judgment is sound and whose honesty is unquestioned. George G. Bingham measures up to this test, and if elected he will serve the people as well and faithfully as he ever did a client.

Voters are prone to think only of the favor they are conferring upon a popular candidate. But there is a different view. The electors are to choose their own public servants. They will best serve their interests if, like private concerns, they take best available material. On this principle the people will do well if they elect Percy R. Kelly and George G. Bingham for Circuit Judges.

## Pendleton Normal School Proven Necessity

(Copied from Portland Oregonian.)

MONMOUTH, Ore., June 26.—The Oregon Normal school opened this week . . . students enrolled 785, largest on record for state Normal in Oregon . . . how to care for large student body a problem . . . 800 being crowded into auditorium with seating capacity of 550. Galleries filled with extra chairs in aisles. More than 150 students seated on platform. New boarding houses completed, additions to rooming houses built and tents used. One hundred girls sleep on upper floor of school. The official school report gives 150 grade pupils in Monmouth, for teacher practice.

"Resolved, that it is the sense of the County School Superintendents of the State of Oregon, in convention assembled, that the best interests of the schools of the State demand increased facilities for the training of teachers, and that we, therefore, endorse the initiative measure to establish a Normal School at Pendleton."

By Mrs. Charles H. Castner, President of the Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs:

"I most heartily endorse the location of said Normal School at Pendleton."

Prof. Robert C. French, Former President of the Normal School Located at Weston:

"An immediate establishment of such a school at some central point such as Pendleton would prove a great asset to the State of Oregon."

B. F. Mulkey, Ex-President Southern Oregon Normal School:

"I shall support the location of an Eastern Oregon Normal School at Pendleton."

State Board of Regents of Oregon Normal School declares that "the necessity for additional Normal school facilities in Oregon is apparent."

Portland Chamber of Commerce endorses measure 308 and says Pendleton most logical location for Normal school in Eastern Oregon.
