Pendleton Normal School Proven Necessity

(Copied from Portland Oregonian.)

MONMOUTH, Ore., June 26.—The Oregon Normal
school opened this week . . . students enrolled 755,
largest on record for state Normal in Oregon . . .
how to care for large student body a problem . . .
800 being crowded into auditorium with seating ca-
pacity of 550. Galleries filled with extra chairs in
aisles. More than 150 students seated on platform.
New boarding houses completed, additions to room-
ing houses built and tents used. One hundred girls
sleep on upper floor of school.

The official school report gives 150 grade pupils
in Monmouth, for teacher practice.

State Normal School at Pendleton."

for the establishment of a Normal School at that place,

gon and Pendleton fills all the government requirements."

Superintendents of the State of Oregon, in convention
assembled, that the best interests of the schools of the
State demand increased facilities for the training of
teachers, and that we, therefore, endorse the initiative
measure to establish a Normal School at Pendleton."

School at Pendleton."
