Oregon News Notes

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

S P Co has spent in Oregon during the present year on new lines and equipment \$1,913,639; on old lines and equipment \$630,887 on stations, shops and round-houses, \$26,069.

Chicago capitalist buys 2,000,000,000 ft of timber in Washington and Tillamook counties for \$1,600,000.

Thirty mile extension of Riverside Branch planned by O W R & N southwest from Ontario Junction.

American Shipbuilding Co at Warrenton secures contract from Norwegian interests for six schooners at \$275,000 each.

Southern California farmers report that eight-hour agitation is causing unrest and scarcity of labor on the farm. They say an eight-hour day can not be applied to farm work.

Of the banks in the state having deposits of more than a million dollars, the two Pendleton banks and the first National Bank of Baker are among the first four.

Conservative Legislation Wins. In Oregon the Single Tax is defeated for the fourth time. The Sunday blue law is repealed. The tax limitation is enacted. Pendleton Normal school defeated.

Oregon's prune crop is the largest and finest in the state's history. It amounts to 40,000,000 pounds and will net the growers \$3,009,000.
