Oregon News Notes

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

Plans approved for Blair round-house Coos Bay line by S P Co. Hood River has a candy and glace apple factory.

Alfalfa ranch sells for \$250 per acre at Stanfield.

Flour mill planned for Canyon City.

Bend is shipping potatoes east. Pacific Tel & Tel Co to spend \$5320 on new cable between Roseburg and Edenbower.

1500 ship carpenters on Willamette & Columbia receive increase in pay.

Shipbuilding is a natural industry for Pacific Coast ports and freight car building a good interior industry.

Willamette Pacific to expend \$50,000 at Eugene on terminals. In the offshore lumber trade, Washington and Oregon tide water mills shipped 34,212,787 feet of lumbes during the month of October.

The Dalles valuations are down \$35,000 and city levy goes up a mill.

Pan Pan Chewing Gum Co capitalized at \$25,000 to be new local industry with factory at Portland.

J H Dyer, Ass't Gen Mgr of the Southern Pacific returning from a month's absence brings cheering reports of the car shortage situation and says that the first lot of new cars recently ordered by the S P Co now is beginning to arrive. The cars will be distributed among shippers throughout the Southern Pacific territory, and Oregon will get its share. Business throughout the Pacific Coast is improving says Mr Dyer.

Several carloads of Tillamook cheese are being shipped to the East this week. First time in history of the Oregon industry that cheese has been sent from here to the Eastern states.

So-called conservation of our water power, coal and oil lands by the government for the "benefit of future generations" is forcing the price of coal and oil so high that the present generation is hard put to find fuel and gasoline to carry on industrial development.

Albany held a successful manufacturers banquet.

Oregon Electric planning a two million dollar extension to Coscaldia timber holdings for Monarch mills at Portland.

Grants Pass holds show to boost corn industry.

Medford-- Work started on \$25,000 Applegate Lumber Co sawmill.

School Meeting

A ten mill tax was voted at the school meeting Saturday afternoon. This will lack several hundred dollars of raising enough money to take care of the contracts for this year's work. A motion for an eleven mill tax was voted down. It is to be regretted that the first motion did not carry, as even this would not have been sufficient for this year's needs, leaving the balance to be paid with warrants. The News believes that if the situation had been thoroughly understood by all present, eleven mills would have been voted, as these bills will have to be paid by the district sooner or later. It is poor economy to try and save money at the expense of our public schools. If we are to retrench, let it be along some other lines.

It is alleged that her health has been broken down and that she has suffered greatly because of the treatment accorded her. No property rights are involved and the couple have no children.—Albany Herald.
