Interment was made in the Miller cemetery Wednesday afternoon.

Oregon Development News in Line of Industries, Payrolls, and Products of Labor and Enterprise.

Astoria harbor being looked over as location for naval or submarine base.

President W B Barratt of Oregon Woolgrowers Association predicts 40c wool for 1917 clip.

Oregon City—Carver R R to sell \$350,000 bonds for extension to Highland.

Michigan men bring sawmill with them to install near Riddle.

North Umpqua fish hatchery to be improved this year.

Canyonville—Old Levens Ledge to operate after 13 years idleness. Will install electric plant, remodel old machinery and add concentrating plant.

Hermiston county proves adaptable to prunes with yield heavy and returns large.

Port Orford mills will ship 30,000 ft white cedar to Bremerton Navy Yards.

Klamath Falls—New \$13,000 steel bridge across Link river completed.

Railroad construction in Oregon during past year includes; S P Co complete Coos Bay line, 118.3 miles, O W R & N complete Eastern Oregon line to Crane, 137 miles, Cal & Ore R R put in operation 15 miles proposed Grants Pass to Crescent City line, Portland and Oregon City have 15 miles in operation and Valley & Siletz complete 13 miles.

Henry H. Quigley

Henry H Quigley was born in Illinois March 13, 1847, died at his home 2 miles west of Scio, Friday January 11, 1917 aged 69 years, 9 months 29 days. Crossed the plains from Illinois with his parents arriving in Oregon in the fall of 1851 where they resided until 1854, moving then to Calif. Mr Quigley was married to Mary E Correyll in Yreka, Cal May 27, 1876 and he and his wife returned to Oregon in the fall of the same year and settled on the home place where he resided continuously until his death. Four children were born to this union, 2 sons and 2 daughters. He was the eldest of 13 children of whom four survive, 3 sisters and one brother. He is also survived by his widow, Mary E Quigley, Mrs Hattie Davis of Harrisburg, Mrs Martha McLaughlin of Crabtree, Thomas and Joseph Quigley of Scio, also six grandchildren. He united with the Baptist church when a young man and joined the Masonic order at an early age also. Was a member of the Scio lodge of A F & A M for the past 25 years, being a mason for 48 years. He was a man of honor and integrity, his word and obligations being lived up to in all his dealings, making him a loved and respected citizen by all of his acquaintances.

Funeral services were held under the auspices of the Masonic order at the Federated church at 11 o'clock Sunday morning, the reading of the obituary and song service being conducted by Rev H B Iler and interment was made in the Franklin Butte cemetery.

J A Burton made a flying trip to Portland Saturday, leaving his home several miles above Scio at 5 a m, and arriving back here at 4:30 p m, via the Albany Mill City motor.

H S Johnston has traded his town property to Mrs Valera Garland for her two acre tract out near the R Shelton home, and the families will exchange residences at once. Both are well pleased over the trade as it is of mutual advantage to them. Mr Johnson will still continue to run a machine shop at his new home where he will do repair work of all kinds.

Fair Will Stay Here

The Linn County Fair will not be moved to this city from Scio, according to the action taken by the board of directors at the meeting held in Scio Saturday afternoon, says the Albany democrat. The directors decided to reject the offer of \$2,000 made by the Albany delegation for the fair grounds and equipment, and proceeded to elect new directors and get ready for the 1916 fair.

Dr A G Prill was re-elected president of the association and the directors were elected as follows: N I Morrison, J L Calavan, Geo Bilyeu, A L Munkers. The Linn county court is to appoint one director. Jennie Shelton was elected Secretary, Roy Shelton assistant Secretary, and E D Myers Treasurer. The time for holding the fair this year has not been set but the board is to set the time at an early meeting and begin preparations for a larger fair this year than before.

It was the opinion of the directors that the offer made by Albany was entirely too low. The Albany committee offered \$2,000 for the Scio grounds and equipment.

The Scio men figured that their plant was worth more money than that if they had to wreck it and sell off what they have by the piece. One offer of \$2,500 was received last week for the 20 acres of ground on which the fair stands, and two of \$2000 each. The tents and other equipment is valued at \$1,400. There is a payment of \$800 made on the grounds, so the directors feel that they would be money ahead if they were to sell out at what they can get.

Scio is still the legal county fair and will again claim the state and county fair appropriations, amounting to over \$2,000, and with a little added energy may pull out of the hole. At least it looks like Albany will have to pay more money if the official county fair is taken to that city.

Miss Hazel Riley and Tim Kelly were married at Albany on Wednesday of last week. They will make their home on the old Serfling place.

Through an oversight last week the News failed to mention the annual telephone meeting which occurred Saturday, January 5. To the satisfaction of all, Mrs J N Weddle was re-elected manager of the Scio central office. The Weddles simply can't be beat when it comes to running a telephone office, and the assertion is ventured that Scio has the best phone service of any town in the state. John Holt was elected president and J B Couey secretary for the ensuing year.
