

Notice To Alien Enemies

To all District Attorneys:

Under the proclamation of the president of date April 6, 1917, it is unlawful for alien enemies to have in their possession the following articles: Any firearm, weapon, or implement of war, or component part thereof, ammunition, maxim or other silencer, bomb, or explosive, or material used in the manufacture of explosives; any aircraft or wireless apparatus, or any form of signaling device, or any form of cipher code, or any paper, document, or book written or printed in cipher or in which there may be invisible writing.

Your cooperation in enforcing this proclamation is earnestly desired. I request that you inform the sheriff of the county and the police officers of your principal cities of the terms of this letter; that you also cause this notice to be published and by this publication notify all alien enemies within your county to bring to either police headquarters or to the office of the sheriff and to there surrender any and all articles which it is unlawful for them to have in their possession. A detailed receipt should be given by the sheriff or the chief of police for all articles so surrendered, and at the close of the war such articles should then be returned.

Give further notice to the effect that any alien enemy who fails to surrender such article within twenty-four hours after such public notice will be subject to summary arrest if such article shall be found in his possession; and the articles will be seized and forfeited to the use of the United States. In this connection, please call particular attention to the proclamation of the President of date April 6, 1917, a copy of which was on that day published in all the newspapers of the state.

A Poor Robin Almanac.

One of the scarcest and most amusing of the early English almanacs is entitled "Poor Robin, an Almanack of the Old and New Fashion" containing a two-fold Kalendar—viz, the Julian, English or Old Account, and the Roundheads, Fanatics, paper-sculld or Maggot-headed New Account," etc. It is a pamphlet of sixteen pages and is dated London, 1690.

The dedication is "to the world" and in it Poor Robin says: "With Pipers, Ballad-singers and Fiddlers it is a merry World; with Prisoners, Sick-people and Money-less persons it is a sad World; with a Soldier it is a hard World; with a Divine a wicked World; with a Lawyer a contentious World; with a Courtier a slippery World; with most men a mad World, and with all men a bad World."

Wheat Trains In Manchuria.

Wheat comes into the mills and to the rivers and railways of Manchuria from almost incredible distances. In the winter, when the rough, ungraded roads are frozen hard and smooth, the natives haul wheat for 200 miles in some cases by means of a heavy two wheeled cart drawn by four to eight mules. Long trains of these carts, traveling together for protection and companionship at night, can be seen on the main highways all winter and are the most picturesque feature of Manchurian life.

Edge of a Windstorm.

A curious example of how sharply the edge of a windstorm may be defined is reported by the captain of a bark. When off Valparaiso, the captain says, a whirlwind came along and passed over the stern of the vessel. A great sea accompanied the wind, and every sail and movable thing on the after part of the ship was carried away. The forward part of the vessel was untouched by the storm, which passed away in the distance, leaving a train of foam in its wake.

Gulf of Mexico Shrimps.

The shrimps from the coast of the gulf of Mexico are of good size, generally fully three inches in length and frequently exceeding this measurement. They are much larger than those caught on the British coast and the north Atlantic coast of the United States. They are in fine condition the year round and may be caught in the lagoons any season of the year.—London Standard.

Old Dutch Customs.

In the fishing districts and on the farms of Holland the old time Dutch customs are still to be found. The quaint costume of the women, with the ancient headdress and the full skirts, remains the pride of the Holland huisvrouw (homewife), and the men, with their wide, baggy trousers, are no less picturesque. The milkmaid, with her two milk pails, polished like silver and swung from a specially built shoulder yoke, is a feature of the street scene in any village.

Tragic Family History.

The following inscriptions are to be seen on a tombstone at Debreczin, Hungary:
"Joseph Moritz, murdered at sixty-two by his son. Isabelle Moritz, wife of above, poisoned at forty-seven by her daughter. Elizabeth Moritz committed suicide at twenty after poisoning her mother. Joseph Moritz, Jr., murderer of his father, died in prison at twenty-seven."—London Standard.

Useful Fireweed.

Fireweed, otherwise known as the "great willow herb," seems to have been created as an antidote for one of the ugliest sights a landscape may offer—burnt over ground. The fireweed is a genuine cosmopolite, for it sends its consoling shaft above the ashes of burnt forests not only throughout America, but in Europe and Asia.

Age of a Whale.

The age of a whale is told by the size and number of laminae of organs in the mouth, formed of a horny substance known as whalebone. These laminae increase in size and number each year. According to scientists who compute the age in this manner, many whales have been captured which were more than 400 years old.—St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
