If we had the wholesaler and the middlemen regulated now so that they would be forced to let the farmer have his seed potatoes, beans, corn, wheat and barley at a reasonable figure the acreage would be much larger of the growing crops this year. The farmer does not need governmental regulation—the crop buyers and food speculators regulate the prices to the farmer, and the situation will never be satisfactory until some power is exerted to regulate these speculators.

Sheriff Bodine and Co. Clerk Russell were in town Tuesday on business connected with taking the coming war census. They have been pretty well over the county and have all preliminary arrangements completed. W G McDonald has been appointed census taker for North Scio and G W Morrow for South Scio. Each will appoint five helpers, all to serve without compensation. Every man between the ages of 21 and 30, inclusive must register or suffer imprisonment. There will be no exceptions to this rule. Even if a man belongs to one of the exempt classes, he nevertheless must register if he is between 21 and 30 years of age. The government will determine who is to be exempt after its records are complete.
